## Sloths' Regatta at Penrith.

First Saturday in December two boatloads of us hiked out to Penrith for the day. It was Jasmen Shabazova's first time racing and, being at the Olympic site, it must have been an awesome experience for her and one that her family back in Azerbaijan would find hard to imagine. The conditions on the water were fairly hairy with gusty, flukey winds building up as the day progressed. This made life particularly difficult for the sweeps so some races were a long time lining up. As always, the paddling was exciting and in a gripping Women's A Final Mel's Belles came in a splendid 5th, just 0.68secs behind Sloths B. Pink Passion was already down at the starting line for their minor final when the regatta was called off for safety reasons. Sob !

It was first day back on the water for Carol Fentoullis after her operation and she drummed up a storm for Mel's Belles. Pink Passion also paddled remarkably well to Jo Cantwell's drumbeat. Just before she left on yet another trip to China, Fairlie Stanish sent me this report on her day at the Penrith Regatta;

*The international regatta centre at Penrith is such a beautiful venue. Since the Olympics the trees have really begun to look established and I was looking forward to being on a marked course for racing – after being at Roseville a few weeks ago (another really beautiful venue – we're so lucky to have all these great places to practise our sport!)*

*Arriving at 9 am, it was soon apparent that it was windy! In the stand I was ferretting in my wheelie bag (yes, my other name is "the bag lady") for that long sleeved zip up top I was sure I'd packed that morning –but I hadn't. No worries, another t shirt did the trick!*

*Our first race was the Mel's Belles heat 1 and tension was rising... I had two races to go as a sweep, before I could become accredited and I was hoping to complete these today. Warmups, then lineups. Race plans running through our heads. Finally loading up and now we were really aware of the windy conditions. We'd seen previous heats take up to 20 minutes before getting lined up for an equal start. The boats were crammed together for loading, blowing into one another sideways. No time to think about it. Load up!*

*pontoon start, the pontoon hadn't materialised, so we were instructed to bring all boats up together to the start line. Luckily the wind died off a touch as we did this and we got our start after just a few minutes of toing and froing. I thought the starter did a great job of recognising the right time to get us going in this semi-lull. 200 metres is just a little over a minute but the race seemed longer as we went through our plan to the end. How well everyone paddled! It was so exciting and we did really well to come 2nd in our heat. Next race saw DAS battling for position. It was a close race between all six boats but DAS maintained a good pace and crossed fifth.*

*One heat down, one heat to go... In the meantime, the pontoon had been positioned but the comp. was running way behind schedule, mainly because of the wind delaying the starts. The organisers made a decision – no*

*second heats, but there would be an A, B and C final so everyone would get another paddle.*

*By the time Mel's Belles set out for the start line in the A final (yes, the A final - didn't that feel great, given the age of our competition!), the wind was even more blustery. What's a pontoon start? Oh yes, someone holds the back of the boat in position for the start, that's right! I never realised that this meant no room for a sweep oar in the water. It was up to the paddlers to keep the boat straight at the start line. Everyone responded really well when asked to draw – a tiring exercise - and the boats lined up a couple of times before we got away... It was hard sweeping to keep the line as we raced to the finish but we made good time in a competitive race, coming 5th.*

*Ours was the last official race though... it was too windy to continue the programme. What disappointment - (shades of Connell's*

Supporters will still race with DASydney, in our sporting crews – and under a new, non-gender-specific crew name (possibly, and this is just the latest suggestion) dasZLERS (instead of Mel's Belles)!

## Who'll be Paddling Where at CNY?

Longer term paddlers will already know that some girls will be paddling in composite boats at Chinese New Year. There are never exactly 20, 40 or 60 paddlers registered for regattas, so to ensure everyone still gets a go, we make up composite crews with paddlers from other DA clubs. That is, some girls from DASydney will inevitably be teamed up with some from other DA clubs to make a full crew of 20. All of us paddle in composite boats on occasions and they are good fun! They are also a great opportunity to meet girls from all over the country.
